Individuals taking scuba diving for credit will be required to pay \$351 plus \$45 for air in addition to the cost of the textbook/cd and PADI (Professional Association of Diving Instructors) materials. Those who take the course for certificate will pay \$135 plus \$45 for air in addition to the cost of the textbook/cd and PADI materials. The certificate granted at the end of this course is an *Open Water Diver Certificate* endorsed by PADI. Policy on Withdrawal: All withdrawals and requests for refunds must be made in writing and will be calculated according to the postmark date it was delivered to the Office of Continuing Education. An individual will be charged a tuition penalty according to the following schedule:

- 0% only when courses are canceled by the Office of Continuing Education
- 25% from the date of registration to the first class.
- 50% up to the date of the second class.
- 75% up to the date of the third class.
- 100% after the 3rd class, no reduction will be given.

Individuals withdrawing from a 7-week module will be subject to a penalty of 100% after the second class.

A written notice of withdrawal must be sent to the Office of Continuing Education. Non-attendance will not constitute notice of withdrawal. The University reserves the right to change tuition rates and other fees without notice. FINANCES

Undergraduate tuition during the 2009 Summer session is \$351 per credit / \$1,053 per 3-credit course. Payment of tuition is payable before the start of the semester. A late charge of 1.25% per month will be assessed on any unpaid balance. Individuals who have an unpaid balance exceeding the cost of a 3-credit course will not be permitted to register for the following semester. Individuals registering for classes on or after the first day of class will be charged a late fee of \$50.

Payments may be made via cash, check, enrollment in a payment plan or credit card via the Internet. All credit card payments for tuition will be processed through the Internet at www.afford.com. There will be a convenience fee assessed by our resource partner, Tuition Management Systems, for this service. Students may also participate in one of the Tuition Management Systems monthly payment plans. The interest-free monthly payment option enables students to spread all or part of annual or semester expenses over equal monthly payments. There are no interest charges and only a fee of \$60 for an annual contract or \$40 for a semester contract. If an individual receives employer reimbursement for tuition, a letter regarding the tuition reimbursement policy is due at the beginning of every semester. The letter must be on company letterhead and include the student's name, semester the letter pertains to, and the reimbursement policy of the company. Each student will receive a billing statement at the end of the semester. It is the responsibility of the student to give the statement to his/her employer along with his/her grade for reimbursement. Payment must be made within 45 days upon completion of the course. Letters may be mailed to the Business Office or faxed to 814-472-3886.
