International Student Programs and Study Abroad have taken over the corner office suite (205-205E) on the second floor in Scotus Hall to bring Saint Francis University the **Global Education Office (GEO)**. International Students Programs will continue to bring Saint Francis University students from around the globe. This is no small task indeed; the office staff does everything from recruiting around the globe, assisting with visas, airport transportation, helping students find jobs, getting social security numbers and driver's licenses to coordinating activities during breaks and offering the Intensive English program. The Office for Study Abroad continues to send students out on multitude international programs. This process includes student interviews, recruitment, assisting with passport and visas, application processing and travel arrangements. Each office will continue to work on their areas of expertise yet the SFU community will see collaboration efforts develop over time. Currently the two offices are working on updating all the University's exchange agreements. GEO recently collaborated on programming for International Education Week, which took place November 12-16. All things pertaining to global programming will go through the Global Education office.

2018 Summer in Ambialet

Ambialet was busy this summer, hosting, among other events, two very important groups.

Our burgeoning high school program filled to the max -- literally not another bed to be had. Thirty-five students, teachers and SFU Admissions personnel spent 8 days exploring medieval French architecture, religious and political history (for credit!). Bishop Guilfoyle High School, Bishop Carroll High School, St. Joseph's Academy, and Bishop McCort High School all sent students and faculty. We are looking to continue to grow this program, likely adding a second session to include Pittsburgh area schools, as well as investigating public school inclusion. An additional scholarship option will be available to students from the summer program who attend SFU and study abroad.

To celebrate the University's 10 years in Ambialet, we hosted an Alumni Tour on June 24 - July 2. It started in Barcelona, where the 44 alumni attended mass in the 14th C Barcelona Cathedral and were overwhelmed by a three-hour lunch, Sagrada Familia (Gaudi's extraordinary architectural masterpiece), dinner and flamenco on Monday, and a visit to the Miro museum on Tuesday. A stop in



Figueres to take in the Dali museum and dinner and overnight in Carcassonne (largest walled medieval city) finished the day. Wednesday, tours of Carcassonne and Toulouse, with the day ending in Ambialet, where the group stayed through Sunday.

July 1 was the grand 10-year celebration. Mass (officiated by F. Malachi and Pere Francisco) was followed by hunting horns, hamburgers (more than 200 were served), a dedication of a plaque marking our ten years, a band, and a grand duck dinner.

The group went to Lourdes on Monday, finishing the night in Toulouse, from where exhausted participants headed for whatever they had planned next. Two members of the Board were part of the group: Jean Rogers and Joe Waterman. F. Malachi, Wayne Powel, Marie Melusky and Eric Horell participated from Loretto.

Finally, from July 20 - August 4 we held the fifth annual Arts in France sessions, which enroll adults, largely from the Pittsburgh area, for one or two week residencies, primarily in painting and photography.

Three wedding receptions, weekly tourist visits, and four post-concert receptions were squeezed in, as well.

Marine Science in St. Lucia

Since 2011 Saint Francis University has been traveling with students to the island of St. Lucia in the West Indies. The program, originally created by Dr. Sue Shoemaker, now led by IDC Staff Instructor Nick Weakland, and assisted by IDC Staff Instructor Dr. Patricia Fitzgerald, has become extremely successful and popular among both science and non-science majors. Because of this opportunity, students are able to witness first-hand, and develop and appreciation for, the effects (both positive and negative) that commercial tourism can have on the natural resources of our planet.

Students in this year's coral reef ecology course collected data samples and recorded field journal notes specific to the reef systems of popular dive sites around the island and compared those findings against those of years previous. Our Scientific Divers include Morgan Ruis, Brittany Mass, Allyson Taureck, Angellica Blanco, Sam Decker, and Tyler Price.



New Traditions Abroad: Thanksgiving Weekends in Ambialet

This year's Thanksgiving celebration for me was a little different: not only are 70+ dinner guests a little outside of my norm, but I have never had Thanksgiving in a centuries-old monastery in France. The evening was a little different for many of our other guests, too, when families from around the Tarn region were introduced to an American Thanksgiving for the first time. For many of the families, this unique cultural exchange began at Thanksgiving dinner, but lasted until the following Sunday afternoon when American students went home with the French families for a long weekend visit.



Over the weekend, each American student spent three nights with a French family while doing things like cooking, bowling, gaming, dancing, shopping, and dining out. The visits were meant to offer both the students and host families true language and cultural exchanges. Cassie Light, a sophomore Aquarium and Zoo Science/ Marine Biology major, had a great time because she visited a family who not only live in the beautiful medieval village of Cordes, but who spoke French, Spanish, German, and English. John McCrystal, a junior IT major from Mount Aloysius felt really at home with his host family, and he learned that American and French families are not necessary that different from one other. Axel, the teenager in the family John stayed with, loved video games and dining out – activities that are also on John's lists of favorite things to do.

Our students also had the chance to teach the French families a little about American customs and popular culture: Madeline Minor, a sophomore Education major at Curry College taught her family how to make American-style breakfast pancakes that everyone enjoyed so much, they ended up making them twice during the weekend. LeAndra Feight, a Physical Therapy major, introduced her family to Spotify, and Alejandra Roa, an Occupational Therapy major, showed her family how they can use closed captioning on their television to help them learn the English language.

PA major, Emily Bare, and OT major, Lauren Hutt, agreed that a common way they bridged language barriers with their families was through music. The teenager in Emily's host family loved *The Greatest Showman* and *High School Musical*. Emily knew that as soon as they got into the car and the music came on, everything was going to be just fine. Lauren's host family loved the music of *Queen*, so they spent a lot of time listening to music. Lauren then taught her family the "Cha Cha Slide" and "Cotton-Eyed Joe" line dances.

In the end, most of the Saint Francis students agreed that the takeaways for them were new relationships, introductions to delicious French foods like aligot and tartiflette, and a better feel for French language. All of the students came to French class armed with loads of new vocabulary words and phrases.

Although many of the American students were initially nervous about this experience, in the end, most agreed that they are thankful for the opportunity. Lauren Hutt, a sophomore OT major said the experience "was a fun, inviting, and unique way of learning. Not only about language and culture, but learning all the great qualities your host family has to offer." And, really, isn't that what a semester abroad is all about?
