2019 Lunar New Year Celebrations at SFU

Saint Francis University has carried on its annual tradition to join with the rich East Asian history of Lunar New Year celebrations. On February 15th, the International Student Programs Office hosted an event at Schwab Hall to ring in the Year of the Pig with students and staff from SFU, popular Asian snacks, colorful decoration, and a campus visit of international Junior and Senior High School students from Bishop McCort.

While Lunar New Year is one of the most important social and economic holidays for billions of people in countries such as China, Korea, and Vietnam, it has also turned into a special annual event for our student community here at Saint Francis. Honoring the Spring Festival or Chinese New Year, as the 15 day festivities are commonly referred to, creates a short but meaningful sense of

being home away from home, primarily for our Chinese students here on campus. At the same time, the event provides a valuable opportunity to bring students together, and to highlight and share the rich cultural traditions of the East Asian region.

Ten days after 2019's Lunar New Year had kicked off on February 5th, we joined the festivities here at Saint Francis with traditional foods, drinks, and lots of red - a symbol of good fortune for many

Asian cultures. Our Chinese students prepared and served dumplings as well as different teas, such as Jasmine and Chinese Red Tea. A variety of typical snacks including rice crackers, peach puff pastry, sunflower seeds, and Wang Zai milk complemented the culinary selection. The event further offered games including a Chopstick Challenge and different activity pages. Our guest students from Bishop McCort High School got involved by creating Chinese hand drums, and received a campus tour followed by a lunch break at Frankie's including typical Asian meals.

Overall, the 2019 Lunar New Year event here at Saint Francis has again been a wonderful time to celebrate the beginning of the new lunar year, bring students from different cultures together on campus, and advertise our school as one, which genuinely cares about its international students as well as their cultural identity and traditions.

New Fall Semester in France Format

In an effort to lower the cost and remove barriers for participation in studying abroad, some exciting changes to the Fall Semester in France program have been made. The duration of the fall semester program has been shortened to 89 days to eliminate the need for a student visa. A visa is required for stays in Europe of 90 day or more. This move will save the student almost \$500 in the visa processing costs. With the shortened semester comes a shorter fall break which greatly reduces the out-of-pocket costs associated with personal travel during a longer break. To provide students with travel experiences missed as the result of a shorter break, Amsterdam has been included to the existing long-stay, all-inclusive excursion schedule. As a group, the fall semester students will visit Barcelona, Paris, and Amsterdam (for those enrolled in CORE 407). Students will see three of Europe's greatest cities and discover a spectacular region of France for the same price as a semester on campus in Loretto. They will meet both young and old in every location visited, as well as in Ambialet, our home village. Students will explore castles, museums, hike, enjoy host family weekends, local festivals and events, wonderful food, wine and cheese tastings, and great fall weather during this transformational experience. These revisions of the fall semester program allow students of any financial status to spend the semester abroad for the standard tuition, room & board costs. The student's financial aid will apply to tuition, plus there are potential grant monies available to cover airfare and incidentals.

2019 Fall Semester in France Applications Still Being Accepted

Students who choose the fall semester will enjoy Ambialet's extended fall weather well into November, which makes it the perfect place to escape the early snowfall in Loretto. Students are not required a visa for the fall semester - saving time and money! Classes offered in the fall are FREN 112, FNAR 102, RLST 390, BIOL 205, CORE 407 and PHYS 104 (fulfills GenEd requirement, taught by visiting faculty member, Dr. Rachel Wagner). New Semester Design for Faculty Teaching in France



HUGS Alternative Spring Break

Twenty-three volunteers (2 administrators, 2 faculty members, 2 alumni and 17 students) traveled to The Bahamas to work with community partners, including the Adventure Learning Science Centre and Camp, the Stapledon School, the Bahamas Association for the Physically Disabled, and the Bahamas Children's Emergency Youth Hostel. Thirteen volunteers (1 faculty and 12 students) traveled to Anconcito, Ecuador, a little fishing village, to work with the Foundation for the International Medical Relief of Children. More than \$4,000 in monetary donations were collected to buy supplies.

The Shields School of Business Completes its 13th Annual School of Business Spring Break Trip to London

Doctors Randy Frye and James Logue and the Shields School of Business hosted 21 students for the 13th Annual Short-term London Study Abroad trip for the period February 28th through March 9th. The trip is part of an international themed course, entitled MGMT 307 Great Britain and the European Union in the Global Economy. Students visited Lloyds of London, the Bank of England, Windsor Castle, St. Pauls Cathedral, Harrods, the Wimbledon Tennis Club, and Millwall Football Club ("The Den"). They also took a guided walking tour of the Financial District in London with a noted London author and guide, and a day later followed the bloody path of Jack the Ripper. Additionally, the group toured St. Mary's University, located in Twickenham, England, and heard a lecture by Dr.

Peter Hill, a professor of public policy and political science, entitled *The Implications of Brexit in 2019.* The group also attended a lecture at the Bank of England on British monetary policy. The London program examines international economics and global finance, as well as British politics, industry, and culture.

I had the great privilege of spending my **Spring Break with the HUGS Trip to the Bahamas**, where I was able to put my Occupational Therapy knowledge to work in a clinical setting. We worked with the Bahamas Association for the Physically Disabled (BAPD) and the Stapledon School, addressing the various needs that they identified. The International Scholars Endowment recognizes outstanding students who wish to pursue advanced foreign language studies in a study abroad program sponsored by an accredited institution of higher education. The scholarship will be awarded to a sophomore, junior, or first-semester senior who wishes to enhance his/her undergraduate education with a study abroad experience. First preference will be given to a student enrolled in an advanced language course. The amount of the stipend will vary each year pending on the endowment policy. To be considered for this scholarship, students must complete the application and submit, along with a copy of a current transcript, to the Office for Study Abroad, Scotus 205, by April 8, 2019.
